

COVID -19 TIPS

In summary, here's a checklist to keep in mind as you return to the outside world:

- Coordinate your immunization schedule to ensure that COVID vaccines and any other necessary travel vaccinations are given at the same time.
- Carry the original immunization proofs with you at all times; don't laminate them; instead, find a safe case or lanyard to keep them in.
- Make several copies of the documents and store a few in different places in your luggage just in case.
- Pre-book any COVID screenings that are required upon arrival and/or re-entry (your WYATT DYNASTY SAFARIS travel specialist can do this on your behalf).

Entry rules in response to coronavirus (COVID-19)

Testing/screening on arrival

All passengers arriving in Tanzania will be required to present a negative COVID-19 PCR test certificate upon arrival. The test should be taken within 96 hours of arrival in Tanzania. All passengers travelling to Tanzania must complete an online Traveler's Surveillance Form. This form must be submitted no more than 24 hours before arrival.

All passengers entering Tanzania will be subjected to enhanced screening for COVID-19 including a mandatory rapid test. The cost for rapid testing is 10 USD per traveler for arrivals in mainland Tanzania and 25 USD for arrivals in Zanzibar. The fee can be paid for through the online Traveler Surveillance Form or in cash on arrival.

Children 5 years and under are exempt from both pre-departure PCR tests and rapid tests on arrival.

The Government of Tanzania is also implementing temperature scanning for all international passengers arriving into Tanzania.

Passport validity

Your passport should be valid for a minimum period of 6 months from the date of your arrival in Tanzania.

How to Travel to Tanzania from abroad

Air travel is the most convenient way to go to Tanzania from Europe. In the country, there are three main international airports.

When Is the Best Time to Visit Tanzania?

Tanzania can be visited at any time, however there are three optimum periods to travel depending on what you want to see.

If you want to see the most animals, come between June and October.

The months of July and August are the finest for seeing the wildebeest migration.

The greatest time to watch wildebeest calving is during the months of January and February.

Now that we've covered the essential Tanzania travel facts, here are our top 10 Tanzania travel recommendations:

Regular entry requirements

Visa:

A valid passport is required for your visit to Tanzania, with a validity period of six months from the date of your visit. Because the Tanzanian high commission reserves the authority to deny

you a visa upon arrival, you should apply for one in advance. Your visa can be requested online through this link. This is the Tanzanian government's only official link.

All travelers to Tanzania must get a visa, which costs USD 100 per person for US and Irish Nationals.

Visitors from the Commonwealth countries do not need a visa to enter Tanzania except the following countries: Canada, Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, Australia, New Zealand, Sierra Leone, South Africa and UK. The fee is USD 50 and is subject to change.

Visitors from non-commonwealth countries are required to pay for a visa (except Rwanda and Romania). The fee is USD 50 and is subject to change.

A referred visa is obligatory for citizens from a number of countries such as Ethiopia, Turkey, and Egypt. The referred visa is one that requires special clearance or permission from the Director of Immigration Services in Dar es Salaam or the Principal Immigration Officer in Zanzibar, and should be applied for at least 2 weeks prior to arrival.

Visas can be obtained at any entrance point, such as an international airport or a border crossing; it is a simple operation that does not require photographs; and you do not require any other documentation other than a valid passport.

Please make sure you have the correct amount of money and currencies with you when you arrive. Most airports lack ATMs, and if they do, you'll usually lose money due to their exchange rate. Furthermore, immigration authorities are unlikely to have changed, and if they do, it would be at an unfavorable rate in Tanzanian shillings. Regardless of the exchange rate, whether you have €50 or \$50, it will be treated the same and no change will be issued.

Please note that if travelling from Zanzibar, there is an international departure fee of \$52.00 per person, which is subject to change without notice (set this amount aside if it is not included in the tour cost or the price of your airline ticket). Zanzibar controls its taxes in a way that is distinct from the rest of the continent, with surprising differences in some areas.

This is simply a guide; please you can still apply for a Tanzania visa at the Tanzanian Embassy in your home country before flying to Tanzania to ensure you meet the right requirements, which will save you time at the airport when you arrive. A regular tourist visa is usually valid for three months from the date of entry and allows multiple entrances into Tanzania from nearby countries such as Kenya, Uganda, and Rwanda, but not from other nations.
